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Rector Invites Us to Join Him



"One in five children will experiment with spirituality... learn to recognize the signs"

This statement made me smile when I read it. It's rich with implication, insight, and humor, maybe even a dash of sarcasm. As you know, this phrase is normally associated with a warning to parents about drug use. But truth be told, the culture in the Bay Area treats religious life as if it were something to avoid and even fear. As a result families are ill-equipped to recognize spirituality, appropriately respond to it and utilize it to benefit their children, their families and, yes, even themselves.

Truth be told, 5 of 5 children will experiment with spirituality. We need to recognize the signs and learn how to guide them. We need to know what spirituality looks like, understand how to talk about it with our children, and then, to equip them and ourselves with tools that embrace, encounter, and nurture the Spirit.

After a group of parents met four times to discuss Dr. Lisa Miller's book, "The Spiritual Child: The New Science on Parenting for Health and Lifelong Thriving", it became clear

that we were being called to rethink our ministry with families at St. John's. Even scientists are now heralding the importance of spirituality in helping children thrive and succeed in life. Researchers from Columbia University to Oxford University are now talking about the power of spirituality and the science behind it. Research shows that children who have a positive, active relationship to spirituality are:

- 40 percent less likely to use and abuse substances.
- 60 percent less likely to be depressed as teenagers.
- 80 percent less likely to have dangerous or unprotected sex.
- More likely to have positive markers for thriving and high levels of academic success.

Please consider joining us for a morning retreat on Saturday January 27th from 9am till noon to hear about new approaches we wish to initiate and to participate with us in shaping the future for our children and families. 

Opiyo Awarded Prestigious Prize

Nicholas Opiyo, Executive Director of Chapter Four Uganda, first visited St. John's in February, 2016, to talk about his life and work promoting LGBT rights in Uganda. The German African Foundation awarded Nicholas the 2017 German Africa Prize for his work in defending human rights, promoting constitutionalism and the rule of law. The German Africa Prize is a prestigious prize given to one person on the African continent to appreciate his or her work in promoting human rights.

The award was presented to him in a ceremony at the Allianz Forum in Berlin on November 23, 2017.



Here is what the German Africa Foundation said of the award:

Opiyo has been honored for his role in protecting peace, democracy, and human rights. Since 1993, the German Africa Foundation has awarded the German Africa Award to honor “outstanding individuals for their long-standing endeavors to foster democracy, peace, human rights, art, culture, the social market economy and social concerns.”

German President Frank-Walter Steinmeier awarded the German Africa Prize to Opiyo saying, “You have become a key figure for your country’s democratic development and your courageous fight for equal rights has been giving hope to so many people in Uganda and beyond.”

After receiving this award, Opiyo reflected, “This prize only helps to remind us of the work we have to do for a better and equal society. It gives us the impetus to carry on knowing there are many people out there who appreciate our most humble contribution. It gives us wider visibility and with it better security in this difficult environment. Hopefully, also, it increases our support base.”

Update on the Invitation Bridge Project

The committee (previously known as “The Think Tank”), charged with advancing the Building Project begun in the early 2000’s and planning the fundraising to support it, has renamed itself The Invitation Bridge (IB) Committee.

The Committee has developed a communications plan to update the Parish on the project. Well-attended parish meetings were held on December 10 and will be held again on January 7, 2018 (at 9 am and after the 10 am service). A comprehensive report will also be provided later in January at the Annual Meeting.

The IB Committee has identified and received proposals from three consultants to assist us with a capital campaign supporting the building project: CCS, Episcopal Church Foundation (ECF), and Theresa Nelson & Associates. All three firms have experience with church capital campaigns and maintain a Bay Area presence. A Capital Campaign consultant would assist us with discerning the level of parish support for a building program, developing a communication plan and organizing a solicitation process – a process which will take about 3-4 months. The most important element of the campaign is the first phase: educating the Parish on the purpose of the building program and how it relates to other parish activities, such as our many outreach programs. Based on this communications and feedback we receive from the Parish, we should learn how much support there is for the project and whether a capital campaign is likely

to be successful before any contributions are solicited.

Selection of the right campaign consultant is essential to moving our building project and campaign forward. The IB Committee recommended to the Vestry that selection of the final consultant be made directly by the Vestry as a part of their oversight of our strategic direction and stewardship of Parish resources. The Vestry accepted this responsibility and appointed a subcommittee led by Kathy Araujo to make a recommendation to the Vestry. Selection of the consultant should be finalized in the next couple of months with the campaign process starting soon thereafter.

Meanwhile the actual construction process has reached a logical pause following removal of 16 trees and demolition of Thornhill 1 while we await approval of three governmental agencies responsible for oversight of construction relating to our Creek. We also have estimates for the budget for construction from this point forward based on proposals from the civil engineering consultant and Oliver & Company, the general contractor we used for the repairs and improvements after the 2014 sewer break.

The IB Committee invites your comments and questions to its members at any time. We encourage you to attend the update meetings on January 7 and hear a complete report at the annual meeting. It is very fitting to start 2018 with a renewed focus on this important chapter in St. John’s development.

Origins of St. John's House

Senior Warden Report from St. John's Annual Report for 1955

[Early in the year 1955], the Bishop's Committee was investigating the possibility of purchasing some portion of the Pressler property which is to the rear of the present Church property and has the advantage of providing an additional entrance from Thornhill Drive. After much negotiating, handled principally by Jay Ver Lee, the purchase was arranged of the Pressler house and additional property which can be developed for a parking area. The purchase price was \$20,000. The Montclair office of the First Western Bank and Trust Company again came through with a loan in the amount of \$11,000 and the Bishop allowed us to retain sufficient money from the proceeds of the loan on the main Church property to take care of the balance of the purchase price. As this report is written, the deal is now in escrow with the title company, all details having been worked out and the closing of the deal is awaiting only the Bishop's signature on the note and deed of trust. It is contemplated that the Pressler home will be used for Sunday School purposes, relieving the present shortage of space. In the future, when we are able to erect a new Sunday School building, the Pressler home, with a little remodeling, can be converted into a vicarage which will be a definite asset to the Church.

Preliminary plans for the new Church School building and renovations to the existing Church School building were completed. Architectural services in connection with these plans were donated by Mr. Keith Ponsford, A.I.A.... During the year the purchase of the Pressler house and approximately two thirds acres of land was negotiated. This property which lies south of the present Church will be available about April 1, 1956, and will be used for additional Church School facilities and parking. When the new Church School building is completed, the Pressler house will be used as a vicarage.

Return to Nepal

This past November I travelled to Nepal for the third time since the April 25, 2015 M7.8 Gorkha earthquake that killed over 8,500 people and left an estimated 3.5 million people homeless. My primary goal for this trip was to follow up on the projects that I worked on during my two month volunteer work with Build Change last year. This included witnessing further testing of stone wall samples and working with the Nepali engineers on developing a research paper on the testing and the conclusions that could be drawn from them.



At the earthquake engineering conference that I attended in January, a team of Nepali engineers and engineering professors started a new initiative to promote confined masonry construction in Nepal as an alternative to the stone and concrete construction that is common in Nepal even though many of these buildings sustained damage in the earthquake. I was invited to join this initiative as part of a team of international advisors with expertise in confined masonry. When I arrived in Nepal the chairman of the initiative ask me to participate in one of the working groups that are developing guidelines for constructing confined masonry houses in Nepal. He also invited me to give a presentation on confined masonry to an audience of structural engineering professionals and students.

The majority of Nepali people who lost their homes in the earthquake are still living in temporary housing. However, there are more people who have rebuilt their homes in the past year compared to the year before. There are also more plans for reconstruction and seismic retrofitting in development. The signs of improvement are present in Nepal and encouraging.



Pizza Club Is MORE Than Pizza

On the first Tuesday of most months, 10-15 kids in the 3-7th grades meet at St John's, and yes we have pizza - a lot of cheese pizza!

These kids have all rushed to church from their after school activities. Many invite friends to join us. These kids are great at Welcoming!

After the kids set the tables and chairs, we sit down to a prayer. Each child shares a prayer of thanksgiving and a prayer of concern as a part of our Grace. Then they eat their pizza like they have not eaten all day.

The casual and funny conversations about their day, pets, siblings, and jokes create the best community for all of them. It gives me a relaxed way to get to know each of them, too.

Since we meet once a month, we talk about the Episcopal seasons. I use each season to share a story about Jesus. This leads into a wonderful conversation of ideas of how they can be the hands and heart of Jesus in their lives. They begin to realize that they have a purpose in their lives besides school. We check in the next month to see what they did in the interim. Often I am amazed how they have translated the story of Jesus into their lives.

After we talked about Epiphany last year, one child shared that she wrote down a list of "new ideas" that she could invite her friends to do with her family. My two favorite ideas were a day at the beach to clean up garbage and making cookies for a new mom in their neighborhood. Both of these she completed with friends.

The Pizza Club Tradition is to play a game of Sardines - hide in seek in the dark. The screaming and bonding that occurs during this game is outstanding. A few of the kids want to teach it to the adults to play at coffee hour.

We end the night with communion when Krista or Scott can join us. On the other nights we share guided meditation as each of them lies in a pew of choice.



All of the events of the night allow the children to have ownership of the spaces in their church. This community reaches out beyond Pizza Club. There are play dates and many of them attend St Dorothy's and The Bishop's Ranch each summer for a week of fun and spiritual growth together. Many of these kids attend different schools and live in different cities. The community that they create at this young age often lasts a life time.

I have offered Pizza Club at St John's for more than 25 years. I am honored to know many of them as amazing adults today. Many of them give back by volunteering as leaders and support with the kids and youth through youth group, mission trips, outreach and sharing how important their faith and relationship to St John's has meant to them. They want to be sure that the future generations have life changing, spiritual, wonderful friendships that they enjoyed as a youth at St. John's.

Pizza Club has been called the training camp for youth group.

As I said, there is more to Pizza Club than Pizza- it is their relationships! With each other, with the staff, volunteers and other adults that are part of their spiritual lives at church, the skills and experiences they learn at St. John's really do help them in the outside world, too.

I hope that the children and youth understand that Jesus is a daily part of lives through their church relationships.
